For quotations that are more than four lines of prose or three lines of verse, place quotations in a free-standing block of text and omit quotation marks. Start the quotation on a new line, with the entire quote indented ½ inch from the left margin while maintaining double-spacing.

About In-Text Citation. In-text citations include the last name of the author followed by a page number enclosed in parentheses. "Here's a direct quote" (Smith 8). If the author's name is not given, then use the first word or words of the title. Follow the same formatting that was used in the works ...

Long Quotes—MLA Citation (8th Edition)—Research Guides

MLA, which sets style for papers written in the field of the arts and humanities, calls a long quote that consists of more than four lines of prose or three lines of verse just that: a long quotation. Omit quotation marks as you begin the quote on a new line, indenting it 1 inch from the left margin; you do not have to indent the right margin.

Quotations of 40 or more words included in a paper are presented in block format. The quotation begins on a new line and the whole quotation is indented 1/2 inch from the left margin. No quotation marks are used and the citation appears at the end of the quotation after the final punctuation mark.

There's a simple rule for how many quotes should be in an essay. Here's a good rule to follow: one quote for every five paragraphs. A paragraph is usually 150 words long, so you're looking at one quote in every 750 words, maximum. To extrapolate that out, you'll want a maximum of about: 2 quotes for a 1500-word paper:

A block quote is a long quotation, set on a new line and indented to create a separate block of text. No quotation marks are used. You have to use a block quote when quoting more than around 40 words from a source. In APA and MLA styles, you indent block quotes 0.5 inches from the left, and add an in-text citation after the period.

How to Block Quote | Length, Format and Examples

Format quotations of 40 words or more as block quotations: Do not use quotation marks to enclose a block quotation. Start a block quotation on a new line and indent the whole block 0.5 in. from the left margin. Double-space the entire block quotation.

Quotes longer than 100 words. Block quoting is most common in literary analysis, where detailed analysis of the original text requires you to quote at length. Block quotes are cited the same as regular quotes, except that if the quote ends with a period, the citation appears after the period. Example: MLA block quote.

Long quotations Place direct quotations that are 40 words or longer in a free-standing block of typewritten lines and omit quotation marks. Start the quotation on a new line, indented 1/2 inch from the left margin, i.e., in the same place you would begin a new paragraph.

Block quotations may be called extracts, set-off quotations, long quotations, or display quotations. Block quotations are used in academic writing but are also common in journalistic and nonfiction writing. While block quotations are perfectly acceptable, it's important for writers to be selective about their use.

How to Use Block Quotations in Writing

The long quotation is indented half an inch from the rest of the text, so it looks like a block of text. There are no quotation marks around the quotation. The period at the end of the quotation comes before your in-text citation as opposed to after, as it does with regular quotations. Example of a Long Quotation

A block quotation (also known as a long quotation or extract) is a quotation in a written document that is set off from the main text as a paragraph, or block of text, and typically distinguished visually using indentation and a different typeface or smaller size font. This is in contrast to setting it off with quotation marks in a run-in quote.

Long Quotations - 40 words or more Start the quotation on a new line and indent the entire quotation a half inch from the left margin. Do not use quotation marks. Indicate new paragraphs within the quotation by an additional indent.

If you decide to use a quotation that is longer than four lines, it is not put in quotation marks but rather indented from the left. Once again remember that you will need to document or show the source of the quotations you use, so make sure that you have recorded all necessary information about the source. A typical quotation is part of a sentence within a paragraph in your paper; however, for longer quotations (more than five lines), format the excerpt as a block quotation. A block quotation begins on its own line, is not enclosed in quotation marks, and has its in-text citation after the final punctuation.

Chicago/Turabian: Block Quotations

Put the quote on a new line if it is over 40 words long. Introduce the quote normally in your paragraph with a signal phrase. End the signal phrase with a colon and start the block quote on a new line. Your signal phrase may look like:

If you are quoting a passage that contains a quotation, then you use single quotation marks for the internal quotation. Quite rarely, you quote a passage that has a quotation within a quotation. In that rare instance, you would use double quotation marks for the second internal quotation. Here's an example of a quotation within a quotation:
